Why waste is important to us














- Waste minimization is one of our key focus areas in addressing our environmental impacts
- With construction and demolition waste making up 50% of total waste going to Aotearoa landfills there's plenty of work to do
- Our purpose is to bring the best of life to our residents and we are committed to creating vibrant, connected, efficient communities
- Our People are vital to our success and we are committed to providing sustainable, meaningful career pathways and opportunities

- In 2022 & 2023, construction achieved their sustainability linked lending target of 75% avoidance for metro sites and 35% & 37% avoidance for regional sites
- 2024 construction landfill avoidance targets are 80% avoidance for metro sites and 39% avoidance for regional sites
- Our waste avoidance programme has prompted the review of the entire building life cycle and is delivering benefits across the organisation





Waste Diversion

Reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill

e.g. Waste diversion from landfill lifted from 30% to 50% with 70% stretch target

Business Growth

Support/promote local businesses involved in waste

e.g. local businesses have greater capacity and maturity on project completion

Education

Raise awareness of waste management & its impact

e.g. trained waste sorters, school students able to participate in initiatives

Tangible Progress to Date

- Positive discussions underway with GIB re backloading offcuts to Christchurch for recycling
- MDC & Summerset sharing their existing waste metrics/data to set baseline
- Learnings from waste approaches shared between parties (Marley)
- In discussion with Waste Management re providing additional waste streams for the region
- Lack of storage for low density items identified as an issue; MDC open and encouraging of initiatives to address this
- Opportunities for material transfer between projects identified e.g. hardfill
- All parties open to logistics opportunities between projects
